Comments:

In my opinion, I think government can do three things to help young couples overcome the major hurdles of affordable housing, education and childcare. They are providing public housing to young couples for a period, subsidizing them after they have their own child and encourage flexible working hours for these couples.

First of all, providing public housing to the young couples can directly help them to own a department in the future. The couples can save money during the period which should be set by looking at their income and living cost. During, these period, they do not need to pay a high rent for housing but saving up the money for purchasing departments in the future. After the period, they have to leave and the public housing can be provided for other young couples who are in need.
